Structure

Housed in the Peter Gilgan Centre for Research and Learning, the SickKids Research Institute community includes approximately 2,000 staff including:

- · 256 scientists;
- approximately 1,500 trainees, including graduate students, research fellows and summer students;
- · visiting scientists;
- laboratory technologists;
- · administrative assistants; and
- other professional and support staff.

Our research ranges from basic discovery research all the way to clinical care and is supported by state-of-the-art expertise, technologies and facilities.

Our research activities are coordinated under seven major research programs, which range from basic science at the sub-molecular level, to organ systems, to population health. The seven programs cover the spectrum of child health from wellness and normal development to causes of diseases, diagnostics, treatments and therapies. Through these programs we cohesively and collaboratively bring together the more than 1,600 funded research projects.

- Translational Medicine


Facilities and Services

Information for International Research Fellows

Work Permit Requirements

As a non-Canadian postdoctoral fellow, you must have a valid Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) work permit to legally work in Canada. Postdoctoral fellows are exempt from the Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA). Time varies depending on the country of application and can take more than 6 months:

SickKids Employment Offer

SickKids will submit an offer of employment online through the Employer Portal and pay a required fee before you submit your work permit application. You will need to include the offer of employment number with your work permit application.

The Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP)

The Ontario Health Insurance Plan provides health insurance for eligible Ontario residents. You may be eligible for OHIP coverage after the first three months of your employment. For information on obtaining OHIP coverage after the first three months of your employment, please visit the OHIP website. You will also want to visit the page specifically for Temporary Foreign Workers. You can enroll in OHIP at a Service Ontario office.

OHIP Replacement Plan

As a SickKids postdoctoral fellow, you and your family qualify for the OHIP Replacement Plan. This plan provides basic medical coverage for your first three months of employment, until you are eligible for coverage under OHIP. Please contact

<u>ask.hr@sickkids.ca</u> for direction about setting up your enrollment in the replacement plan. You must enroll as soon as you arrive in Canada, and your coverage will begin on your first day of employment at SickKids.

Obtaining a Canadian Social Insurance Number (SIN)

In order to be paid through SickKids payroll, you require a Social Insurance Number (SIN). More information about the SIN and how to get one is available on the Service Canada website.

You can also find a nearby Service Canada location that issues SINs on the Service Canada Website.

You will need your passport and work permit to apply for your SIN. If you are a temporary worker you will be given a temporary SIN number that will have an expiry date. If you are a temporary foreign worker (on a work permit) and apply for permanent residence status, you must reapply for a permanent SIN once your permanent residence status is confirmed.


Employment for Spouses, Partners, and Dependents

If your appointment as a SickKids postdoc is for six months or longer, your spouse/partner (husband, wife, or common-law partner) and/or dependents may qualify for a work permit. To find out if your spouse/partner and/or dependents qualify for an open work permit, please visit the "If your spouse wants to work in Canada" and "If your children want to study or work in Canada" sections of the CIC website.

If you are common law, you may need to complete a Statutory Declaration of Common Law Union form in order to obtain your spouse's work permit.

Study for Spouses, Partners, and Dependents

Your spouse/partner and/or dependents may be eligible to study in Canada while you are here as a postdoctoral fellow. Please visit the study section of the CIC website for more information.



ONBOARDING

Submit Documents to Human Resources

You will receive an email from the SickKids HR department with information regarding your next steps once your supervisor contacts HR to start the hiring process. Please provide all the documentation outlined in the onboarding email:

- · Personal information form
- Benefits package
- Copy of void cheque or direct deposit form
- · Work permit
- · Immunization forms
- VSS (Vulnerable Sector Search)

Badge

Upon arrival on the first day, postdocs can get a temporary badge at the security desk on the ground floor if it has already been coordinated by their supervisor or their department. They need to return the badge as they leave work that day. They repeat this until they receive the onboarding email within a week after they hand over the required work and occupational health documents. At this point, postdocs can go with a

government-issued photo ID to the badging office at the main hospital building, 555 University Ave, to obtain the ID badge.

Immunization

May vary by nationality/countries you have visited, visit

Some tests can be done in your home country – All the vaccinations required need to be done at home, others can be done here Extra vaccines can be done at the prevention Centre in Sick Kids 5th Floor Burton Wing. This will be for free if you have a Sick Kids Badge.

Finding a Doctor or Dentist

To secure a family doctor (also sometimes referred to as a general practitioner or primary-care physician) in Toronto, you must find a doctor who is accepting new patients. The College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario offers a useful web tool called Doctor Search to help you find a family doctor. Once you have a valid OHIP card, you can also use the Health Care Connect service to find a family doctor. While you are seeking to be added as a regular patient to the roster of a family doctor, you can make use of the services of walk-in clinics. These clinics will see any patients, regardless of whether or not they have a family doctor, and often do not require an appointment. A list of Toronto-area walk-in clinics can be found via the Findhelp directory at

You will also need to find a dentist in your local area who is accepting new patients. The Ontario Dental Association offers a search tool called Find a Dentist to help you find one. The Faculty of Dentistry at U of T also has patient clinics offering full-service dental care at reduced rates.

Alan Brown Building

The Alan Brown Building is located at 77 Elm Street, is owned and operated by The Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids) as a support for SickKids research. Located across the street from the Hospital, it provides temporary and affordable accommodation for new professional staff. All apartments are unfurnished (unless items were purchased from the previous residents) and freshly painted and cleaned as required.

Occupancy at the Alan Brown Building is reserved for the following:

- SickKids fellows, residents, PhD students and observers arriving from either other cities or overseas, and limited to the period of their fellowship, residency or study period.
- Nurses hired by SickKids, who are relocating from another city. Occupancy may be limited to a 12-month period in order to provide assistance in finding accommodation somewhere else in the city in the interim.
- Other professional staff hired by the Hospital, who are relocating from another city. Occupancy will be limited to a 12month period in order to provide assistance in finding accommodation somewhere else in the city in the interim.

<u>Application</u>: It is in your interest to apply as early as possible as your place on the waiting list will be determined by your application submission date.

Here is a non-exhaustive list of the most common rental scams and tips to avoid them:

- Seller demands payment upfront
- Post from a social media account with no pictures
- Avoids sending further pictures upon request
- · Lack of documentation
- Request for payment before a property visit
- Big promises without asking background information
- · Requesting private bank information
- Lack of personal contact, either over the phone or in person
- Price is too good to be true

Prevention is always better than trying to recover from a scam after the fact. But if you have been scammed:

- File a report with the police
- Report the scam to Housing (whether you found them through our site or not) and any other listing site(s) you found ad on
- Contact Downtown Legal Services to see if they can help you take the scammer to court

Information on Renting

Rental housing into Toronto may be a whole home, an apartment within a home that has been subdivided, an apartment within a designated rental building, or an apartment within a co-operative or condominium building, where unit owners may rent out their apartments.

Most tenants in Toronto are required to provide two months' notice to their landlord when they wish to end their lease agreement; this means that you should start looking for housing to rent two months before the date you wish to move in. Move in dates are normally on the first of the month. Many landlords will require the payment of two months' rent (the first month and the last month) at the time of signing the lease agreement. Most leases in Toronto are for a minimum of twelve months.

<u>Settlement.org</u> provides comprehensive information about renting a home in

Ontario that you may want to review; it is available in a number of languages. They also publish information about the <u>average cost</u> of apartments of various sizes in Toronto and surrounding communities that you might find helpful.

Prior to entering into any lease agreement, you may wish to review the Residential Tenancies Act, which lays out your rights and responsibilities as a tenant, as well as the laws that apply to your landlord. You can also download a guide to the Residential Tenancies Act in more than 10 languages.

Ontario Home and Community Website

Ontario official website provides guidelines and information about <u>your rights</u> as a tenant in Ontario.

When renting, landlords and tenants need to complete the <u>standard lease</u> for most private residential tenancies for new agreements signed on or after April 30, 2018. This guide is also available in 22 languages.

When complete, the standard lease creates a contract between the landlord and tenant. It is also called a residential tenancy agreement.

It is written in easy-to-understand language and includes information such as:

- the rent amount and when it's due
- what's included in the rent (for example, air conditioning or parking)
- rules or terms about the rental unit or building (for example, no smoking)

It also has a section on renter and landlord rights and responsibilities, and explains what can (and cannot) be included in a lease.



For example:

- who's responsible for maintenance and repairs
- · when your landlord can enter your unit
- that landlords can't ban guests or pets

After Moving

When renting an apartment or house, utilities will normally need to be connected. The major utilities are phone, internet, hydro (electricity), and gas (heating); you may also want to set up cable television access. Your landlord will tell you which of these are already included in your rent, and which ones you need to have connected and pay for separately. There are many companies that provide these services. You can search for companies that provide electricity and heating at the Energy Shop website. You can find a list of internet providers that service Toronto here; many also provide phone and TV services. The internet, phone, and/or cable service providers you can use may be limited by where you live.

The company may require proof of identification (your date of birth AND your Canadian driver's license number, passport number, citizenship number), and information/verification of your employment status before it agrees to connect services. Your MOU/job offer letter can be used as verification of employment. Please contact the company to get more information.

Finances

Taxes

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) administers tax laws for the Government of Canada and the provinces, including Ontario. You must file your tax return annually by April 30.

You can file your taxes:

- Online using certified tax software
- · By mail using paper forms

Getting Help

Important Note on Moving Expenses
If you relocated within Canada for work,
you may be eligible to claim moving
expenses on your tax return. However,
moves from outside Canada generally do
not qualify for this deduction. Some
individuals have had to repay refunds
after claiming moving expenses for
international relocations. Always consult
the CRA or a tax professional to confirm
your eligibility. Learn more.





Salary

The amounts below are just general suggestions of the minimum amount a postdoc should be paid by experience. You can discuss your payments with your PI.

Year	Minimum Salary
1	\$50,000
2	\$52,500
3	\$55,000
4	\$57,500
5	\$60,000
6	\$60,000

LIFE IN TORONTO

Presto Card

PRESTO is a reloadable payment card that lets you pay your fare on the TTC, GO Transit, UP Express and 8 other transit agencies in Ontario. It's the perfect time to get a PRESTO card to take advantage of benefits like lowest fares, balance protection, Autoload and 2-hour transfers. When you download the PRESTO app you can load passes or money, manage up to 10 cards and check your balance. Driver's licence

An Ontario driver's licence gives you permission to drive in the province of

Ontario. In some cases it can also be used for identification purposes. Depending on what country you are from, you may be able to exchange your current license for an Ontario driver's license. If your country does not have an exchange agreement with Ontario, you may be able to get credit for your past driving experience toward a new Ontario license. Please visit the Ministry of Transportation website for more information about exchanging or getting an Ontario driver's license.

If you have brought a car to Ontario with you, you must register it with the Ministry of Transportation. You must also have your car inspected and secure insurance. Please visit the Ministry of Transportation website for more information.

How to get to and from the airport

Union Pearson Express runs from Pearson Airport to Union Station in downtown Toronto in just 25 minutes. Adult one-way fare from Pearson to Union is \$12.35. Children under 12 years of age ride free. The first departure from Union is at 4:55 am, and from Pearson is at 5:27 am. Trains depart every 15 minutes until 12:57 am. Further information is on can be found here.

It is important to get an SIN before opening a bank account, this account is then important to give the void check needed in the HR onboarding.

Library Access

Because Postdocs work with one of the faculty members who have a cross-appointment with that hospital or institution, they can get library access (both in person and online).

To obtain library access, they need a letter from their supervisor, written on institutional letterhead, indicating the following:

- Name
- · Date of birth
- · End date of your fellowship.



Take this letter and a piece of governmentissued photo ID to the <u>Reader Registration</u> desk at Robarts Library, 130 St. George Street, second floor.

Postdoctoral Fellows who are working at one and paid by one of our affiliated hospitals are not entitled to a TCard. You will be issued a library card when you set up your library access but not a TCard.

Canadian Phone Plan

Purchasing a Canadian phone plan might be considered the first thing to do since people may be required to provide their phone number when they want to open a bank account or complete their onboarding documents. There are plenty of companies at Eaton Center (260 Yonge Street) which allow people to compare different phone plans. In doubt just get the cheapest and then you can change for the one better fits your needs.

Childcare: Schools & Daycares

With a valid work permit, you can enroll your child(ren) in Ontario public schools for free. You'll need to provide documents like proof of address and immigration status. In Toronto, visit the https://www.tdsb.on.ca or check the

https://www.ontario.ca/page/ministryeducation for other regions. The https://studentlife.utoronto.ca/task/enrolling -children-in-school/ is also helpful.

Licensed child care options include centres, home-based care, and before/after-school programs. Start your search early—waitlists are common. Use the https://www.toronto.ca/community-people/children-parenting/children-programs/child-care/ or https://settlement.org/ontario/daily-life/childcare/finding-child-care/.

You may qualify for a City of Toronto subsidy to reduce licensed child care costs. You don't need permanent residency, but you must:

- File your Canadian taxes
- Receive a Notice of Assessment from CRA
